



Truth is nuts are high in calories and fat, but they also contain numerous health benefits as well, the key being not to eat too many at a time. Nuts are a good source of natural protein, fibre, and antioxidants, as well as omega-3's (good fats). Another benefit is that nuts increase metabolism, by improving the amount of energy used while resting. One way to incorporate nuts into a diet targeting weight loss, is to replace carbs with a healthy serving (1-1.5 ounces).



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CUT: The cut of a diamond determines its ultimate beauty. A diamond cut to correct proportions will give off an unrivalled radiance. Cut a diamond too shallow or too deep, and the light will escape through the bottom or the sides.

COLOUR: As a general rule, the less colour a diamond has, the brighter the appearance. Truly colourless gems are extremely rare CLARITY: Refers to the number of imperfections in the diamond, known as inclusions. Most diamonds have inclusions; the fewer the inclusions the more rare and valuable the stone

CARAT WEIGHT: Diamonds are sold by weight in carats. The heavier the diamond, the more valuable it is. But bigger doesn't necessarily mean better. Quality is found in diamonds of all sizes.

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LABOUR SHORTAGE BY THE NUMBERS

- ▶ The largest labour shortages indicated in the survey are found in skilled and technical jobs, followed by clerical and administrative jobs;
- ▶ 81 per cent of local businesses expect critical shortages in the next five years, particularly with computer and engineering skills. Sales and general help positions are also facing shortfalls;
- ▶ 45 per cent of companies have a year or less notice that an employee plans to retire;
- Reduced days or hours is the most common method of phased retirement, but only 18 per cent of employers offer any kind of phased program; and,
- ▶ Only 43 per cent of medium to large businesses have a dedicated human resources staff to assist with strategic planning and other personnel issues.

While the majority of boomers said flexibility was a key factor for them, a minority of businesses saw

flexibility as important. The \$500,000 study is being funded by the provincial Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities and it launched last summer with a survey of 1,000 youth, 1,000 seniors and 200 employers to forecast trends, including likely gaps in the workforce.

The data provided already is critical to workforce planning, Ms Williams said.

The data also revealed 80 per cent of businesses are aware changes are coming, but few are preparing.

The same was true when employers were asked about retention incentives or benefits for those approaching retirement age.

Despite having vacancies and an aging workforce, most businesses don't consider labour supply an issue, the survey found.

Following this month's workshops, a final report, including best practices and other information, will be tabled in February.

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
