games. Against Bur Oak, they made a pair of threepoint shots late in the game that hurt us," he said. "It just boils down to conditioning."

Adding to Hamilton's positive outlook is the enthusiasm exhibited by his 15 players.

There's a good core of players who advanced to the tier two quarter-finals last year.

The returnees include guard Nicholas McEwan. A combo guard, the Grade 12 student scored a teamhigh 30 points in their loss to Bur Oak.

Also inserted into the club's starting lineup are forward Jeremy Brownridge, Patrick Laffan and guards Patrick Raymer and Atieq Wasim.

Expected to bolster the Spartans' chances will be the return of six-foot, five-inch power forwardcentre Connor McDonald, who has been nursing an injured ankle he incurred during a preseason tournament.

The Spartans also have five players who moved up from the junior ranks last season, including guard Theo Grammenis and two new faces to the school in Grade 11 guards Aaron Tan and Jordan Russel.

"It's just a matter of our new faces blending into our system," Hamilton said.

The Spartans senior girls' volleyball team will make its tier one debut Wednesday when it hosts Pierre Elliott Trudeau and Bayview (Richmond Hill) starting at 3:30 p.m.

The Spartan junior boys' hockey team resumes its schedule Tuesday when it visits Bill Crothers (Markham) at Angus Glen Community Centre at 3 p.m.
