She played along.


The phone rang again at noon, but this time it was "your grandson's friend, Mark Fortier".

## Operations centre of controversy

Councillor places blame for delays, overruns at new \$10.7 M facility

From design changes and project co-ordination issues, to poor contractors and bad weather, the town's new \$10.7-million operations centre has encountered just about every problem a construction project could endure without completing failing.

But Dec. 21, the Bethesda Road facility was deemed substantially complete and an occupancy permit was granted.

While the blame for the project's fourmonth delay and subsequent budget overrun can be pointed in various directions, one councillor has put it squarely on the shoulders of MHPM Project Leaders, the project

managers. "Its your responsibility to look after this." Councillor Phil Bannon told Ron Spina, principal at MHPM, during the Dec. 21 council meeting.

In an interview with The Sun-Tribune, Mr. Bannon added: "The people who get paid the big bucks, leading these projects, should be held accountable."

Contracts between the municipality and MHPM do not provide for penalties if the project goes over budget or runs late. However, those stipulations are in all contracts entered into between the town and contractors, according to Dave Cash, CAO for the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville.

The role of the project manager is to work
