Finch flying since leaving blueline

When Christian Finch was informed by Stouffville Spirit general manager Ken Burrows and head coach Craig Donovan he would be shifted from defence to forward prior to the start of this Ontario Junior Hockey League regular season, he was a tad hesitant.

Entering his second season with the Spirit, the 19-year-old, six-foot. 180-pound Unionville resident has always been on the blueline, going back to his first organized game at the age of three.

But when duty called. Finch answered the bell.

Looking back on that moment, Finch has no regrets. Neither does the Spirit's braintrust.

With the Spirit playing some of their best hockey in recent days. including a nine-game winning streak, and with the regular season winding down. Finch's performance up front has been a major factor in the club's surge to where they're challenging the Markham Waxers for second place in the North Division standings.

In 44 games this season, Finch is the club's second-leading scorer with 24 goals and 48 assists.

Those numbers are rapidly approaching a target of 75 points he set prior to season.

"It's sure turned out for the better," Finch said.

"At first I was kind of hesitant to do it because I played on defence for the last little while.

"I wasn't sure of the move. But our general manager thought the move to play forward would be good and I told them I'd give it a

The hockey staff saw chemistry developing when Finch skated alongside Neal during weekly skates last summer.

"As a defenceman, my skill set is on offence in the way I see the ice," said Finch.

While Finch started the season on a line with Neal and Andrew Doyle, he said their unit became more potent with the arrival of Tyler von Engelbrechten from the Pickering Panthers Dec. 8.

"Tyler is a pure goal scorer and that's what we needed on our line," Finch said. "Matt (Neal) and myself could move the puck and Matt also has a good scoring touch and he's quick. That's why we work well together."

COLLEGE DREAMS

The numbers Finch has compiled so far this season couldn't come at a more opportune moment as he hopes to earn a One program in the U.S.

last year from St. Augustine Catholic High School in Unionville, Finch has had preliminary discussions with U.S. recruiters.

"I've talked to about four or five schools and they're just waiting to see us when the playoffs start," he said.
