

# MPPs differ on hydro debt

Downtown Stouffville was stop No. 20something Monday for Conservative MPP Jim Wilson, who was on a six-day, 40-city tour calling for a forensic audit of Ontario Hydro's \$7.8-billion debt retirement charge.

Stouffville families pay between \$67 and \$84 a year towards the debt retirement, which was instituted by Mr. Wilson when he was energy minister in 2002.

"I don't regret restructuring Ontario Hydro. It was bankrupt. I mean, it couldn't pay its own bills and we wanted to keep it as an economic engine," Mr. Wilson said.

The debt was scheduled to be paid off in 2012, according to Mr. Wilson.

"It should have been a good news story. Finally, (the) government paid off some debt and then the debt charge would drop," he said.

But now, the Liberal government does not anticipate the debt coming off the books until between 2015 and 2018.

"Without explanation, they have repeatedly pushed back the debt repayment date, at a cost to Ontario families of around \$1 billion per year," Mr. Wilson said.

The reality, according to Helena Jaczek, Liberal MPP for Oak Ridges-Markham is the residual stranded debt her government inherited was \$20.5 billion, not \$7.8 billion.

The Tories are isolating just the residual stranded debt without acknowledging the rest of the stranded debt left to the Liberals. according to Ms Jaczek.

The government has reduced the debt by \$1 billion each year since 2003 and it is on target to put another \$1 billion toward the debt for the 2010/2011 fiscal year, she said.

That decrease has also meant \$408 million a year in interest has been paid, she said.

"We feel we're managing the debt we inherited from the Conservative government," Ms Jaczek said, adding customers are now paying more of the true cost of hydro.

Mr. Wilson, the MPP for Simcoe-Grey, took on the 40-city tour at the request of Ontario PC leader Tim Hudak, who wants to look at ways of reducing people's hydro bills.

"It's the No. 1 issue with people right now," Mr. Wilson said. "Mr. McGuinty has backed down on things before, like sex-ed for little kids and we think he'll backtrack on this if we put enough pressure. That is what I'm trying

As of Jan. 1, customers are receiving 10 per cent off their hydro bills through the Clean Energy Benefit and the start of off-peak hours for time-of-use electricity was changed from 9 to 7 p.m. on weeknights.
