The Ontario Minor Hockey Association midget A championship series opens today in Stouffville.

The Stouffville Clippers host the defending champion Amherstburg Stars in a rematch of last year's final starting tonight at 5 p.m. at the Stouffville Arena. Game 2 goes tomorrow at 4 p.m. at the Clippers Sports Complex.
