Complaints prompt sign changes

'Re-elect' changed to 'bring back'

Lui Temelkovski says he listened, discussed and compromised.

But the federal Liberal candidate for Oak Ridges-Markham says he does not regret erecting more than 1,000 signs throughout the riding asking voters to re-elect him.

He says his signs will now read "bring back".

The former MP held the riding from 2004 to 2008, when he lost to Conservative Paul Calandra.

"It's good that he's decided to do the right thing on the signs. (But I'm) disappointed he didn't change the literature," Mr. Calandra, who is seeking reelection, told York Region Media Group.

Mr. Temelkovski has been distributing campaign literature bearing the word "re-elect". It was also used in his website and campaign e-mail address.

"Bring back" will now appear on Mr. Temelkovski's large signs and website, he said. Lawn signs on private property will have "bring back" on them at the owner's request, he said.

The confusion over who was

Books recorded in a Stouffville Road studio have given the gift of literature to thousands of Canadians during the past 25 years.

The Talking Book Library program at Christian Blind Mission (cbm) is celebrating a quarter century of providing Christian reading material to people across the

country who can no longer read printed literature.

The library is hosting an open house Tuesday from 4 to 7 p.m. to mark the occasion at cbm, 3844 Stouffville Rd., between Kennedy and McCowan roads.

Guests can tour the library and recording studios, see post recording work, an overview of how recorded books are made and enjoy refreshments.

Lauren Flook, cbm's volunteer co-ordinator, will be on hand to talk about opportunities at the library.

Forty people currently volunteer at the library.

Christian Blind Mission is an international organization

"focused on breaking the cycle of disability and poverty in the world". It helps more than 12 million sick and disabled people each year and aims to be one of the top 10 providers of non-governmental aid.
