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

Where do candidates stand on rape?

An open letter to those running in the federal election.

Recently I read a newspaper article about a 17-year-old girl who was gang raped. This article finally moved me to write a letter I have been meaning to write for years.

I do not believe our justice system takes sexual assault (or rape, whatever you call it), seriously. To refer to this single example, this 17-year-old girl will have a lifetime of trauma. If the perpetrators are caught, I doubt they will receive even five years in prison.

Our system needs to automatically designate certain types of rapists as dangerous offenders. At a minimum, this includes anyone who molests a child, and anyone who takes part in violent assaults whether as part of a gang or as an individual. This designation should be applied on the very first conviction.

I realize these types of offenders are not going to be deterred by the dangerous offender label (and the consequent indefinite jail term); I propose this for the protection of women.

Additionally, to bring justice to the victims, we need research leading to policy to define what healing really means to a person who has been the victim of this crime. Simply locking up the perpetrators won't completely help the victim. It is a first step, but it is not the last step.

Finally, research leading to policy needs to be done on how to prevent sexual assault and to determine whether rehabilitation is possible for the offenders.

To those running in the election, I would like to know where you stand on this issue.

And let me know what I, as an ordinary citizen, can do to help.
