Lawn placards told election tale

Lawn signs do vote. And exit polls are pretty darn accurate, Kreskin.

Who knew?

We all do following Monday's Tory cakewalk through the riding of

Oak Ridges-Markham. That was south Stouffville resident Paul Calandra celebrating a landslide win in his own hood, just down the street at Boston Pizza.

Less than an hour after results started appearing, the incumbent was ear-to-ear smile, strolling into the pizzeria and shaking at least half of the 600 hands in the room. Most of the other hands were busy clutching celebratory beverages.

That's a far cry from his first win 2-1/2 years ago. The bar was legally closed and much of Stouffville's commuter crowd was halfway through its evening sleep when victory was declared at about 2 p.m.

We awoke to have a Conservative MP for the first time in a long time. Just barely. A win by 545 votes in 2008. Expanded to a margin of 20,821 votes Monday. Yowza.

That's a big-league vote of confidence in any league. Confidence in Mr. Calandra, his boss Stephen Harper, the Conservative or all of the above? You decide. You already did.

Those signs told the story in my Stouffville neighbourhood and many others, blue Calandra placards outnumbering the combined opposition 10 to 1.
