Johnny Cash impersonator got late start on career

Close your eyes and you'd swear you were listening to the late Johnny Cash up on the stage, according to Musselman's Lake residents Al and Trudy Yetman.

In reality, it's tribute artist Brian Simon who will perform at the Lebovic Centre for Arts and Entertainment - Nineteen on the Park Sept. 18 as part of the monthly series Sing-Along with Al and Trudy and Musician Friends.

The North Bay-based tribute artist is also bringing along a number of his musician friends.

Like most other musicians, Mr. Simon learned how to play the guitar when he was a teenager. But unlike most teens, he kept his abilities to himself.

"I was finding it hard to find a voice I was comfortable with so I sang alone a lot," according to Mr. Simon's website.

But one day, someone who actually heard Mr. Simon sing said he sounded similar to Johnny Cash and suggested he become a tribute artist.

Mr. Simon started taking part in jam sessions, then formed his own band, the Johnny Cash Tribute band, in 2005 and started play-

ing at local events up north.

Mr. Simon performs mostly Johnny Cash songs, but he does add a few of his own originals.

Al and Trudy's monthly concerts have historically been free, however, the Yetmans are requesting those attending the Johnny Cash tribute show donate \$10 at the door, \$15 per family, to help pay for the expenses incurred by the musicians who travelled from North Bay. Reservations are also being accepted.



"We were never close friends but do share many memories," he said. "As cops, we stick together and I am very proud of the brotherhood of the badge. When we lose a colleague or a friend, we come together and do whatever it takes to support each other and our families."


While investigating the driver, he was caught by the vehicle as it accelerated, York Regional Police Chief Eric Jolliffe said.

Trains rolling next weekend


