Halloween-themed train rides on the York Durham Heritage Railway start this Saturday. They also run Oct. 29 at the same times.

Trains will depart Uxbridge station at 11 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. for a 90-minute ride to the line's summit in Goodwood.

Children up to age 12 dressed in their best Halloween costumes get to ride for free. There is a maximum of two children per adult. Fares are otherwise \$16 (adults), \$14 (seniors and teens), \$11 (children not in costume) and \$48 for a family of two adults with a maximum of three children.

Round trips between Uxbridge and Stouffville will also take place Oct. 23 and 30 at 10 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. both days.

Trains depart at noon from the Stouffville station on Main Street for the round-trip.

Fees are \$23 (adults), \$21 (seniors and teens), \$15 (children not in costume) and \$68 for a family of two adults with a maximum of three children.

The decorated trains will also feature musicians, a magician and clown. Snack

service will be available. Children will receive a loot bag.

The best costume will receive a prize.
