NO GRANT MONFY FOR **OUTDOOR** POOL

Town wanted \$2.8 M to replace park facility

The town's application for a \$2.8-million grant to help pay for an outdoor water park has been denied.

The municipality was notified of the federal government's decision about two or three weeks ago, according to Marc Pourvahidi, the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville's director of finance and treasurer.


No reason was provided as to why the application was denied, Mr. Pourvahidi said, adding a formal request for a reason has been submitted.

"It may help us in the future," he said.

In February, the town applied for a \$2.8-million grant from the federal government's Enabling Accessibility Fund to help pay for a \$4.7-million water feature, which included an outdoor tank pool and water park, to be built adjacent to the Lebovic Leisure Centre in Stouffville Memorial Park.

"Because the grant was not
