Domestic violence victims aided by United Way donations

United Way of York Region's 2011 campaign has achieved 40 per cent of its target, chief executive officer Daniele Zanotti announced this week.

Accepting a cheque from King Mayor Steve Pellegrini representing the results of the town's inaugural employee campaign, Mr. Zanotti said \$3.4 million had been raised to date toward the campaign goal of \$8.6 million.

Despite being 5 per cent below

last year's pace, he's encouraged and hopeful.

"(King's) gift helps us bridge this gap and I can tell you, our thousands of volunteers and hundreds of workplace campaigns remain driven and determined, confident that the coming weeks will further bridge this gap. The need requires nothing less," Mr Zanotti said.

In addition to the progress update, Mr. Zanotti announced a new round of strength investments. Launched last October, the program funds projects that bring

residents, community, businesses, faith groups and agencies together to work on simple solutions to complex social issues. For 2012-13, strength investments will provide funding to broad-based communi-



"Our research and community discussions all validate one finding, civic participation remains the catalyst in community change," United Way community investment director Janice Chu said.

Most recently, the York Region

Driven by the leadership of Sandgate Women's Shelter of York Region, the collaborative is developing an innovative way to increase service to children and women who have experienced domestic violence and abuse, all under one roof.


