MPP wants negotiated settlement to YRT strike

Thornhill MPP Peter Shurman was disappointed but not surprised by Thursday's failure of his private member's bill, which would have sent striking. YRT workers back to their buses and the parties to arbitration.

Instead of ending the strike, things are effectively back to square one, with no talks scheduled and no end in sight.

The bill, tabled at Queen's Park yesterday, failed to pass second reading and head to committee.

The NDP joined the Liberals in voting against the bill, citing its requirement

that YRT be designated an essential service.


Mr. Shurman offered an olive branch, saying he was happy to ditch that element before the bill went farther, but NDP House Leader Gilles Bisson described it as a "poison pill" he could not swallow, despite supporting the idea of sending the two unions and three companies involved in the strike to arbitration.


Asked Friday if it would have been wiser to have left out the essential service aspect from the beginning, Mr. Shurman said he thought it was important to highlight the double standard by which Toronto residents have their transit

deemed an essential service, while York Region residents don't.

Whitchurch-Stouffville MPP Helena Jaczek called the bill "a very superficially attractive proposition."

"It's very much what we saw in the election only less than two months ago from the PC Party," said the member for Oak Ridges-Markham. "It's very easy to call for a simplistic measure like tax cuts when you don't consider where the service cuts are going to come from. We know that the people of Ontario rejected, on Oct. 6, those politics of division. This is precisely where negotiation and a nuanced response are what is required."
