alyssa McConnell, 12 and Kendall Schofield, 13, are close friends.

Both are Grade 7 students attending Summitview Public School.

Their friendship, dating back to Grade 1, was further strengthened when Kalyssa had the presence of mind to run for help after her companion became stuck up to her waist in mud and water at Lehman's Pond located at the rear of their Manitoba Street homes.

It was after school. The two girls were playing near the edge of the pond as they'd done many times before. Suddenly, Kalyssa realized she'd ventured too close to an area they call "Dead Man's Pit".

"Don't come over here," she remembers calling to her friend.

But Kendall didn't heed the warning, seeing Kalyssa was already stuck.

"I wanted to help," Kendall rescue. said, "but I, too, fell in up past my knees.

"I was starting to sink," she recalled. She cried out to Kalyssa, "go get help".

And Kalyssa, who had freed herself, responded, running as fast as she could to her friend's house, a short distance away.

Fortunately, Kendall's mother was home. She came directly to the site. By this time, her daughter had sunk down to her waist. The but this didn't work either. mother was unable to pull her free. She then ran back to the house and returned with two shovels.

Using one shovel as a lever, Kendall, assisted by her mother and

Kendall said although several people were walking dogs in the immediate pond area, none responded.

"It was cold and I was frantically waving my arms but people just stared and kept walking," she said.

She remembers Kalyssa using a tree branch in an attempt to pull her free but this didn't work.

It was close to an hour before she was finally freed.

"At this part of the pond, the water's really deep," Kendall said. "any longer and I would have

gone under."

She says the fire department would likely have been called as a last resort "but I didn't want to cause any more fuss."

"I prayed, 'please God, don't let her go under, "Kalyssa said.

What did Kendall's mother say? She wasn't angry, just glad everything turned out OK, Kendall replied.

Kalyssa says despite the close call, they'll keep returning to their favourite play area.

"But we'll never go back to that spot," she added.

Cynthia McConnell, Kalyssa's mother, thinks the pond area, a popular site for dog-walkers, lacks adequate warning signage.

"Skaters are continually warned about unsafe ice so why not do the same with respect to bog-holes?" she asks.

She said she'd been in touch with the town but as yet no permanent safeguards had resulted.
