No deal from Dragons' Den handshake

Game inventor sought app investor on show

Almost 200 handshake deals worth about \$60 million have been made during the past six seasons of the TV show Dragons'

Stouffville's George Ward shook hands with dragon Arlene Dickinson in 2010 on a deal that was to be worth \$50,000 and result in a smartphone application of his board game Syl-lables.

Today, there is no deal and there won't be one.

"We kept trying to make it work because we both really wanted it to but it just fell apart, Ms Dickinson told The Sun-Tribune. "He has an interesting idea and I think he'll do well on his own" but I don't think there is a big enough market for a partner.

"It's not an investment I think I can get the return I would look for," she said.

Ms Dickinson and Mr. Ward made an agreement in principle in April 2010 when Mr. Ward, the vice-president of sales and marketing for Stouffville's Toy-Sport Agencies and owner of Twin Titan Innovations, pitched his business plan to the five dragons looking for investment money to
