Parents scramble as teachers strike

Families of 80,000 York Region school children scrambled to find child care today as their teachers took to the picket lines.

York's public school board is the only Ontario board so far to keep its 170 schools open during the rolling one-day walkouts, but supervision was minimal and parents were strongly urged to find alternatives.

While almost 7,000 teachers and occasional teachers picketed outside the board's Aurora headquar-

offices, supportive high school teachers, who are working to rule themselves, delivered doughnuts on their lunch hour and students from across the GTA headed to a mass protest at Queen's Park, all part of the furor unfurling over

Bill 115.

York is the largest school board in the province to be hit so far in this, the fourth day of the escalating dispute pitting secondary, elementary teachers and school support
