The carnival takes place next Saturday from 1 to 4 p.m. at the Cedar Beach Pavilion at Musselman's Lake.

A male suspect remains on the run following a robbery at the CIBC on Main Street in Stouffville Thursday.

York Regional Police received the call around 9 a.m.

A man dressed in dark clothing and believed armed with a knife, attempted to rob the bank, according to police.

No injuries were reported and it's not yet known if anything was taken. York police spokesperson Const. Blair McQuillan said.

Uniformed officers, the criminal investigations bureau, tactical team, hold-up squad and K9 unit all responded to the scene.

The bank remained closed late in the day, although instant tellers were operating. Customers were directed to branches nearby.

York board to rescue high school proms

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Buy that gown and book that tuxedo, Stouffville District Secondary School Class of 2013.

You may not get to take part in school sports or clubs in York Region public schools, but if you're a student, you will get your prom or graduation, despite the teachers' extracurricular boycott.

York District School Board administrators announced Thursday they have put together a contingency plan to ensure proms and graduation events go ahead, with or without teacher assistance.

It's the second school board in the GTA to announce a bail-out for the cherished annual events that were endangered when teachers

withdrew from voluntary activities in protest of Bill 115.

Peel District School Board has told its 34 schools to go ahead with prom plans; board staff will provide central planning and co-ordination support, staff to assist and, if needed, volunteer central staff in administrator roles to provide additional supervision, spokesperson Ryan Reyes said.

Rhiannon Kyle, prime minister of the York Region presidents' council — the board's student senate - said students are elated with

the news. "Most students are thrilled that their voices are finally being heard," the Aurora High School Grade 12 student said. "Hopefully more decisions in the best interest of students follow suit."
