Earthquake zone still shaken

Water, washrooms, power lacking: Stouffville orphanage operator

Garment factories and a convention centre are being constructed, yet more than 350,000 Haitians remain in displacement camps, some with no running water or washrooms.

Most children have worms or parasites, according to Dave Lock, executive director of Freedom Global Outreach.

"Yeah, they're living. Yeah, they're functioning. But they have parasites," the Stouffville resident said.

Mr. Lock has been to Haiti 12 to 15 times since the Jan. 12, 2010 earthquake, which killed more than 300,000 people and displaced more than a million more.

For nine out of 10 Haitians, nothing has changed since the quake, according to Mr. Lock, who noted not many jobs have been created, there is no reliable electricity, clean municipal water or sewers.

More than 60 free medical clinics have been created with Canadian money, he said, but in order to access them, you need to know where to find them.

Foreigners have become just another face in the crowd. However, according to Mr. Lock, the large non-governmental organizations have created a mini inflation by purchasing

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
