Spirit coaches look forward to better season

Stouffville Spirit co-owner and general manager Kenny Burrows wanted to retain Jeff Perrin as head coach along with assistants Steve Sedore and Brad Barton for the 2013-14 Ontario Junior Hockey League season.

Likewise, Perrin, Sedore and Barton wanted to return behind the bench.

Call it a done deal as Burrows recently announced the trio will return for a second season.

In his discussions with the coaching staff, Burrows said the decision to have them back was a priority.

While it might have been easy for Burrows to make a change behind the bench based on the club missing out on the playoffs for the first time since the late 1990s, he said the Spirit was in a transitional phase in which they had to replace a good number of key veterans from their 2011-12 OIHL championship squad.

Based on what talent was on the team, not even Houdini could have pulled off a magical trick to get a relatively youthful squad back into serious playoff contention, Burrows said.

"The coaches and I talked things out and they're all coming back. I wanted them back. We were in a growing year and to have Jeff (Perrin), Steve (Sedore) and Brad (Barton) back wasn't difficult at all," Burrows said.

Perrin said he was informed by Burrows before the season concluded his entire coaching staff would be back.

"It sure feels good," Perrin said,
"I'm excited to be coming back
because that's what we were building for.

"This past year was a rebuild and we're definitely looking forward to next season."

Perrin said his priority will be to have the club take a more disciplined approach, including cutting down on goals against and penalties.

Burrows and Perrin have been beating the bushes during the last few weeks scouting major midget. Jr. B and Jr. C games with the hope of finding prospects who might don a Spirit jersey next season.

What Burrows likes about this time of the year is observing which players can and cannot respond positively to the rigors of the post-season.

"From around late February

into March we get to see playoff hockey and we see a lot of good or bad things that a player might do," he said.

Acknowledging he doesn't know how many returning veterans might be back in the fold for next season, Burrows said they do know what type of players they would like.

"I think we'll be a faster club than last year," Burrows said. "I'm big on that. Speed draws a lot of penalties."

With the club's rookie camp set to take place May 3-4, Burrows said he hopes they can have close to 100 hopefuls in attendance.


