How sad is that.

A golden opportunity to improve the look of our central business district could be lost to in-fighting.

On the same weekend editorial page, fellow Stouffville resident Nancy DiGiovanni writes about the same development proposal, hoping the housing in the plans will be of the affordable variety so her children will be able to remain living in their home town.

The DiGiovanni family is not alone on this issue in Stouffville and across York Region as our current series on housing problems in this area has revealed.

Not everyone can afford, or needs, a four-bedroom backsplit on an acre of land.

Affordable or not; the downtown condominium project is exactly what the province ordered municipalities to do: intensify development.

In other words, build up not out. It's the opposite of the systematic sprawl we've known so well in York Region.

Residents of a downtown condominium would add foot traffic for our Main Street stores and services.

Condo owners wouldn't even require their own cars, with our extensive GO train and bus service almost at their doorstep. That's another positive lifestyle change in our normally vehicledependant world.

The problem is the scope of the project.

It's no surprise a developer is shooting for the moon, and as many units and floors as possible, in their opening salvos.

That's business.

It's up to the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville, especially our elected councillors, to make the call.

Reduce the size and impact of the project.

Move on.

(Kudos to the town for involving residents by providing regular updates and hosting a series information meetings for residents of the neighbourhood and beyond.)

We hope the project is a go. It could be a ground-breaking game-changer for our commu-

It could set an example for what can and should be done with some properties on our main drag.
