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Work-to-rule alters SDSS awards night

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The 2012-13 academic year had a bit of a void in the Stouffville District Secondary School's athletic calendar.

Receiving the Homestead Award, given to the students who contributed at the highest level in the areas of athletic involvement, leadership and organization in the department, were Yulenda Heng and Chris Matsoukas.

The Sue Leroy Spartan Spirit Award, presented to the athletes who best displayed the attributes of the former Spartans teacher and coach of 25 years, went to Mackenzie Harrington and Rob Paul.
