Best crop in 20 years' ready

This year's strawberry crop is the best it's been in more than 20 years, according to Matt Passafiume, owner/operator of Applewood Farm Winery.

Thanks to the cool, wet, yet sunny spring, strawberries are peaking just in time for the long weekend and coincidentally enough, the Strawberry Festival.

"Strawberries don't like the heat." Mr. Passafiume said, however, they seem to be handling this week's heat wave rather well.

This year's crop is double the size of 2012's and the berries are bigger and juicier.

"It was a disaster," Mr. Passafiume said of his 2012 strawberry and apple crops. That was due to the early thaw, which was followed by a deep freeze and then a hot summer.

The king berries, which are the first to come off the vine, are weighing in around 20 grams at the McCowan Road farm and winery.

"If you're looking to impress the dinner guests (go with) the bigger ones," he said.

Jammers should wait a little lon-

ger for the smaller berries.

For the past five years, the picking season has lasted 10 days. This year, picking is expected to be extended to three weeks — until July 15.

"It's a good, long season," Mr. Passafiume said.

His farm is one of several in the area. For more information, go to ontarioberries.com or foodland. gov.on.ca

To pick your own berries at Applewood, the cost is \$5 per person, which gets you a 1.5-litre basket to fill.

Or you can purchase pre-picked two-litre baskets for \$2.

Over the long weekend, people can also purchase strawberry and rhubarb fritters, along with strawberry wine from the winery.
