Penny-saving St. Mark students chip in for Habit for Humanity

The old adage of every penny counts is particularly true for Habitat for Humanity.

The York branch wants to collect 10 million pennies, which is what it costs to build a home.

"The penny's going out of style, so let's pitch a penny drive," said Kate Higgins, volunteer co-ordinator for York Region Habitat for Humanity.

"This is another way to get people involved in our program," she said.

St. Mark Catholic School recently contributed 4,745 pennies to the Uxbridge ReStore penny drive.

"I thought we might get a few," said Margaret Grandison, education assistant for the school's Grade 6 class.

Every class participated in the month-long drive. The school has about 350 students, according to Ms Grandison.

In school got the idea from Uxbridge's Josh Morrison, who, for the past two years, has been collecting the copper coins. However, it wasn't until a trip to the ReStore earlier this year did he know what he wanted to do

with his pennies.

"He said they didn't meet their goal last year, so I want to help them meet their goal this year," said his mother Gloria Morrison.

"He just envisioned wheelbarrows full of pennies being wheeled in," she said.

Since March, he has collected 55,500 pennies.

Originally, the family counted and rolled each and every penny. Now, they are put into bags of 100 or 300 and weighed on a special scale, according to Ms Morrison.

In York Region, money from the Newmarket and Vaughan ReStore locations support Habitat for Humanity's administrative costs. All donations go directly to the cause of building homes.

"That's something that separates us from a lot of organizations," Ms Higgins said.
