Sear shooting for NCAA scholarship

When Ben Sear prepared for the 2013 golf season, he was looking for improvement.

So the 16-year-old Stouffville resident made some technical adjustments to his game.

It's paying off.


He captured his first ever tournament title at the four-day Canadian Junior Golf Association Match Play Championships at St. Andrew's Valley Golf Club in Aurora last week.

Entered in the boys 15-19 division, Sear claimed top honours by defeating Hugh McLaren of Midhurst three-and-one in the championship match.

"It sure feels great to have a win under my belt," said the York Downs Golf and Country Club member. "I made some changes to my swing this season in terms of movement at the top and I changed my grip. It's taken me a while to really start hitting it well consistently. But I really hit it well this week."

In reaching the final, Sear completed the two-round stroke play

held earlier in the week by finishing in a two-way tie in eighth place after going six-over par at 150 (75-75). Sear then proceeded to the 16-player match play field by defeating ninth seed Brady Zordan of Midhurst five-and-three; 16th seed Thomas Brazil of Ajax four-and-three and fourth seed Paul Edgar of Kitchener two-and-one over the course of two days.

"I hoped that I would do well as you do entering any tournament," he said. "But I like match play, it seems to work well for my game."

"I just stuck with what I had to do and did not allow myself to get rattled," he said. "In the final I felt I was in control of the match."

He was introduced to the game by his father Mike when he was five years old.

Sear hopes that momentum gained from that outing will carry over into his next big event at the Golf Association of Ontario under-17 championships in Renfrew Aug. 20.

"That's the plan," he said with a smile.

Entering Grade 11 at Stouffville District Secondary School in September, he doesn't have any golfers on the PGA Tour he tries to emulate. Nor does he have any he looks up to for inspiration.

"I just try to do my own thing," he said.

However, he would like to parlay his skills on the links to bigger things down the road by attaining an athletic scholarship at an NCAA school south of the border.

Bobby Hughes has new home in ECHL

When Bobby Hughes takes to the ice for the upcoming East Coast Hockey League season he will be doing it in a new surrounding.

The 25-year-old Stouffville resident has been dealt by the Alaska Aces to the Fort Wayne Komets for future considerations. The Aces said Hughes requested a trade so it would enable him to be closer to Stouffville.

Last season, his first with the Aces, Hughes was their secondline centre and led the club in playoff scoring with nine goals and eight assists in 11 contests. During the regular season, Hughes amassed six goals and 11 assists in his first 32 games.

But he began to assert himself during the second half of the season, as he had nine goals and 13 assists in the club's final 27 regular season games.

Hughes was drafted by the Carolina Hurricanes 123rd overall in the 2006 NHL draft after starring with Kingston of the Ontario Hockey League.

Ivy Steinberg recorded a fourth-place finish at the Investors Group Ontario Senior Women's Amateur golf championships at the Stratford Country Club in Stratford Thursday.

Entering Thursday's final round in third place, the 56-year-old Stouffville resident and Granite Golf Club member recorded birdies on the fifth and 15th holes. But she double bogeyed the first and 11th holes and bogeyed the sixth, ninth, 12th, 16th, 17th and 18th holes to go eight-over par at 80.

Winning the 2008 and 2009 provincial senior women's championships, Steinberg concluded the gruelling three-round event at 10-over par at 226 (75-71-80).

Aurora's Mary Ann Hayward, 53, captured her third senior women's title after going seven-under par at 209 (68-70-71).

"They deserve a chance to be looked at. We'll see what happens," he said.
