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

Adding online voting a must to increase participation, council

ast week's Sun-Tribune article and editorial accurately captured the resistance to positive change Stouffville needs to improve voter participation.

By simply offering the option of voting from the comfort of home, municipalities like Whitchurch-Stouffville can boost voter turnout.

Known as secure Internet voting, electronic voting or e-voting, the process of participating in elections without leaving the comfort of home is an attractive option for many residents of Ontario municipalities.


Huntsville has recently seen voter turnout increase more than 50 per cent when the online option was offered. In 33 other cases, participation increased 4 to 20 per cent with no reported security breaches.

In this light, some of the councillors' comments are simply a result of FUD – fear, uncertainty and doubt – about a topic that they may not fully understand.

There is no doubt people want to have the option to vote by electronic means as long as the process is fair and secure. Hacking fears are simply not a legitimate argument against e-voting.

By using standard protection such as data encryption, safeguards against unauthorized activity and properly configured systems. Whitchurch-Stouffville will demonstrate it cares about its voters' preferences.

Every year, towns like ours show they are not willing to abandon disabled voters and those who live far from polling stations. People who prefer more convenient voting options can no longer be treated like spoiled children who should just get out there or be excluded because they may simply

not come out.

This is not because residents are apathetic. They may have young families or other urgent matters. Besides, we're almost 1/6th of the way through the 21st century already. Let's get with the program!

Councillors should ask: What's the program? Here is a three-step process:

1. Select the best e-voting system you can afford;

Follow a standardized process for evaluating its security;

3. Carefully analyze statistical data to incrementally improve voter satisfaction.

If council is truly worried about electoral fraud, security breaches or privacy issues, then let me help.

Make a commitment to your constituents and I will work with the municipality to ensure you have secure systems, processes and data. Moreover, as part of a new resident e-voting awareness program, I will personally ensure that staff are properly trained and councillors are knowledgeable about the risks associated with e-voting.
