Be aware of ad scam: York Police


A York Region business owner expressed his frustration after getting caught up in a phoney advertising fraud by a "smooth talking" scammer.

So far, police said about four businesses in York have come forward. Even more have come forward in Barrie. Police said the publication is legitimate and does solicit advertising, but the suspect does not work for it.
