Spirit breaks out of scoring slump in Buffalo

GAME NOTES: To score goals it only makes sense that you have to direct any shot on the opposing goalkeeper. That's what Stouffville Spirit head coach Jeff Perrin had been trying to preach to his club during a recent scoring drought, including a 4-0 road loss to the Trenton Golden Hawks

But when the Spirit took to the road for a cross-border tilt against the West Divisionleading Buffalo Junior Sabres Tuesday, some good things happened when they got the puck on net. A four-goal outburst in the second period enabled the Spirit to break a three-game losing streak with a 5 2 victory.

Trailing 1-0 after the opening period, the

Spirit erupted with four straight goals to take a 4-1 lead through 40 minutes. Spirit captain Matt Heffernan scored twice. including one on a power-play effort near the midway point. Kyler Challis and Peyton Backus each added single tallies. Carrying that momentum into the third period, the Spirit padded their lead to 5-1 on a goal by Matthew Dunlop near the midway mark. Just under two minutes later, Buffalo cut the Spirit's lead to 5-2 on a goal by Michael Ederer. But that would be as close as they would get. Dylan Gamble accounted for the game's first goal for Buffalo, who lost their fifth straight game.

In Trenton, the Golden Hawks broke open a scoreless tie through 20 minutes with goals from Ryan Kinsella and Tyler Donaldson to take a 2-0 lead into the second intermission. The Golden Hawks added their final two goals in the third period with Brady Wiffen and Hunter Fargey sconng near the midway mark. Golden Hawks' netminder Denny Dubblestyne stopped all 23 shots directed at him to record the shutout. The Golden Hawks directed 28

shots on Daniel Mannella. For the Spirit, the loss marked the third time this season they were shut out. The win by the Golden Hawks was their sixth in the last seven outings.

INSIDER: The Spirit suffered one injury in Tuesday's win when forward Mike Morgan incurred a lower body injury. Perrin said Morgan remains doubtful for Saturday's tilt against the Wellington Dukes. Forward Daryl Thomson is still a couple of weeks from returning to action. Perrin noted his leg is healed but it's now a matter of trying to build the muscle back up.

Former Spirit coach and current Newmarket Hurncanes general manager and head coach Brian Perrin will assist Wellington Dukes general manager and head coach Marty Abrams in directing the OJHL North-East Conference All-Star team at the 2013 Central Canada Cup All-Star Challenge in Terrebonne, Que. from Dec. 27 to 29. Perrin is the older brother of Spirit head coach and fellow Whitchurch-Stouffville resident Jeff Pernn.

GENERALLY SPEAKING: "When you get a

chance you have to put the puck on net and four went in," said Perrin of his club's success against Buffalo. "We had our chances in the first period but we couldn't finish. In the second period we put the puck on net and the puck went in:

"We don't have any natural scorers that will get 30 to 40 goals, so we have to score the way we did Tuesday."

Reflecting on his club's recent scoring drought, Perrin was quick to point out all teams experience that dilemma at some point during the marathon of a season.

At the same time, he noted for his club to put too much thought into scoring goals it could jeopardize what they do at the other end of the rink.

"Every team goes through that. Some nights you will score and some you won't no matter what you do.

"If we concentrate too much on trying to score, other parts of our game will go somewhere else. We want to play a solid team game."

Looking ahead to Saturday's home game

against the Wellington Dukes, Pernin hopes his team will recall what happened to them when they met earlier in the season which resulted in a 4-0 road loss Sept. 27.

At the same time though, he acknowledged the Dukes, who currently occupy third place in a highly competitive East Division, won't roll over.

Especially since they possess a highly skilled and experienced roster that's gearing up to host the Dudley-Hewitt Cup this season.

"They're a good team that works hard, they're disciplined and well coached," said Perrin. "We have to do something to limit their scoring chances and score when we get chances.

"Every game you need a break here and there and part of that is done when you create your own breaks."
