On Saturday, Patrick and staff aboard their unique eight-passenger lorry, will share the celebratory spotlight in Stouffville's Santa Claus Parade. Our lyrical descriptive follows:

Watch for it. An eight-passenger battery-powered golf cart, the O'Neill Funeral Home's first-ever entry in Stouffville's Santa Claus Parade.

And possibly the first-ever vehicle of its kind in any Santa Claus parade.

It'll be part of a mile-long procession Saturday that will begin at 2 p.m. from Tenth Line North and Aintree Ave. and conclude on Main St. West at Weldon Road.

The event is hosted by The Kinsmen Club. Storybook Christmas is this year's theme.

LeBlanc began looking for such a vehicle. He wanted it to complement the current valet parking service already in operation in its parking-challenged downtown neighbourhood.

Unfortunately, he would discover limousine carts accommodating eight passengers to be few and far between.

To his surprise, however, he learned a firm called Bennett Golf Cart Co. was located locally near the intersection of Tenth Line North and the Bloomington Road, just north of Stouffville. With head office approval he placed an order.

Three months later it was delivered to the door.

"We put it to use the same day it arrived," Mr. LeBlanc said. "It's been going steadily ever since."

The need for such a unit became obvious, he said, after a funeral service, arranged for EastRidge Evangelical Missionary Church, forced many people to walk considerable distances to the chapel from the rear of the parking lot. Added to this was his personal observation of a similar unit in operation at Mt. Lawn Cemetery in Whitby.

"I submitted my request to head It was six months ago that Mr. office and their response was totally positive," he said. The purchase price was \$9,600.

The cart is fully licensed and insured although licensing is not customarily required because such vehicles are generally confined to private properties, Mr. LeBlanc explained. "But it surely is a conversation piece," he said. "It makes passengers feel special."

The maximum highway speed isn't known, he says, because there's no speedometer. He guesses 10 km/h would be the limit.

A covering (or fringe) can be lowered to protect riders from the rain, snow, sleet and sun.

The cart is powered by eight batteries, each of which can be recharged after eight hours' use.


To fit the décor of the day, the cart will be gaily decorated with Christmas lights and garlands. Proper signage has been ordered. The majority of staff will either be on board or walk alongside including: Mr. LeBlanc and daughter Chloee, Tim Jones, Francis Kelly, Brandon Loughheed, Bob Tabone, John Halse and Kelly Martiniello, accompanied by spouses and family.

Other staff members will be kept busy serving free hot chocolate from a booth at the corner of Church and Main streets, a tradition that's been popular with parade goers the past three years.

"Christmas is a very special time," says Patrick, "it's an honour to be a part of so important an 🖾 event. He says looking out into a sea of smiling faces, both adults and children, brings to life the true spirit of the season.

"We're very excited."
