

WASTE PICKUP DELAYS BLAMED ON WEATHER, STAFFING

Deep freeze replaced by weekend rain

high of -7 Celsius today to +7C, with rain, on Saturday. according to www.theweathernetwork.com. Sunday and Monday are also expected to stay on the

The beginning of the week had us contending with temperatures in the -20C range with windchills nearing

Flights throughout North America were grounded or re-routed. York Region school buses and taxis were cancelled Tuesday, along with those in other areas of the province.

The frigid temperatures have also hampered blue box and green bin collection in the regions porthern six municipalities, which includes Whitchurch-Stouffville.

Some local residents have had their recyclables and compost sitting on the curb, waiting to be collected, for about a week now.

The region's northern six municipalities' contractor — Green for Life (GFL) — has been experiencing issues with malfunctioning trucks, an ice storm and its aftermath along with a decrease in its staff, according to Maria Schembri, the town's spokesperson.

All of last week's blue boxes and green bins were to be collected by Jan. 6. That did not happen.

Regular blue box and green bin pick up for this week has now been pushed back a day.

For example, if your collection day is normally today. it will be Friday. Friday's regular collection date will be Saturday, according to a town media release.

All items need to be curbside by 7 a.m.


"In the event of non-collection please leave materials at the curb and crews will retrieve them as soon as possible," stated the town media release.

Residents are asked to not place receptacles on top of snowbanks as collection crews cannot climb them. Bins are to be left in the driveway until picked up.

Christmas tree collection scheduled for Monday has also been delayed.

"Residents are advised to keep them at the curb until collected," Ms Schembri told The Sun-Tribune via email.
