Whatever the question, she has the answer. We should know, having tested her expertise on many occasions. Like last week. However, it was she who concluded the conversation with a request.

"If you're doing an article on the election," she said, "one piece of helpful information you could help disseminate involves voter identification. All electors must bring a piece of identification with them to the voting place. This includes their name and qualifying address. Producing a piece of identification is easy if you drive, but not easy if

you don't."

Ms Kennedy explained that during the last municipal election she was surprised by the number of people who had no identification whatsoever in their wallets or purses. She recommends an Ontario photo card from Service Ontario: ontario.ca/government/ontariophoto-card. The cost is \$35.

 That a four-year salary cap be imposed on department heads earning more than \$100,000 per year.

 That councilors should publish quarterly ward newsletters but not as a budgeted expense.

 That the current ward system be abolished.

 That a zero tax increase be the town's decree in each of the next four years.

 That Mayor Wayne Emmerson be selected chairman of the Region of York, a decision that would bring distinction to our town.

 That all town council meetings be held during evening hours.

 That a prayer, common to all religions, be determined by the Stouffville Ministerial Association and used at openings of all town council meetings.

 That a new seniors' centre be added to the indoor pool/public library complex.

 That the deteriorated cenotaph in Stouffville's Memorial Park, honoring town benefactor Arthur Lat-

cham, be refurbished.

• That York Regional Police utilize the convenience of new town quarters as a convenient means of deterring speeders on Hoover Park Drive and Millard Street.

 That additional traffic lights be located where Main Street intersects Edward, Church and Baker streets.

 That the town make the Millard Street reservoir more user friendly rather than a current runabout for uncontrolled canines.

• That the conservation authority be requested to demolish the age-old Duffin Creek flood control dam and replace it with something attractive.
