Why is everything so expensive for special needs' children, Angel Neill asked.

She is the mother of an eightyear-old with tuberous sclerosis (TS).

Neill would like to buy her daughter, Waverly, a special bike. It costs \$5,000 new or \$2,200 used.

Neill, who is married and also has a six-year-old daughter, was recently bought out by her company and is not working.

"It's been tough," she admitted. To help pay for the bike, the Vulcan Meat Club is holding its inaugural Stouffville Meat Fest Sept. 13 in Memorial Park from 3 to 11 p.m.

Admission is by donation at the

door.

"There's really nothing I can do but raise money. Your heart goes out to the family. I've been lucky to have healthy kids," said J. J. Bouwmeister, co-founder of the Vulcan Meat Club.

Waverly was diagnosed with TS at three months of age.

TS is a genetic condition characterized by skin and central nervous system lesions, generally benign tumours and seizures.

While neither parent is a carrier of the gene, TS can occur as a "spontaneous genetic mutation," according to the Tuberous Sclerosis Canada website.

Cause of the mutation remains unknown.

How severely TS affects a person ranges from an individual never knowing he or she has the illness to developmental delays.

"She's definitely not eight years old," Neill said, noting Waverly is developmentally delayed, walks off balance and suffers from daily seizures.

Last year, her grandmother, Deanna Soules, published a children's book - Waverly and the Blue Dolphins - to help raise money for a TS cure.
