when combo gets together**

Blend a Robert Burns' poem with songs by Bob Marley and Alistair Hulett and you have a most unique musical mash-up.

"I think that's what we do. We, as humans, like putting different colours together to see what comes out. ... And really, it's a lot of fun," said Whitchurch-Stouffville reggae artist Jason Wilson.

Wilson is teaming up with fiddler David Swarbrick and saxophonist Pee Wee Ellis for a show at Nineteen on the Park Nov. 8.

You might just hear that mash-up, along with a lot of other folk and reggae songs.

"I don't want to give too much away," Wilson said.

"To have these two guys come to Stouffville is something else. I'm just glad to be along for the ride," Wilson said.

Wilson, 44, and Swarbrick, 73, teamed up for *Lion Rampant*, which was released earlier this year.

It was the first time Wilson recorded an entire album with one other person, so giving up half of the control wasn't always easy. But Wilson admitted when Swarbrick suggested something, he was "usually right".

"To have these two guys come to Stouffville is something else. I'm just glad to be along for the ride."

In 2013, Wilson finished his PhD. Since then, he's been "playing reggae music of course."

Wilson teaches a couple of courses at the University of Guelph as well as at the school's Humber campus.

It's usually not until the end of the term do his students figure out who he is, at which point they ask for a song.
