## Pancake brunch a sweet treat




On April 15, volunteers at Whitchurch Stouffville Museum hosted the annual pancake brunch, with real maple syrup. What a treat!

## CBM RESCUES "FORGOTTEN CHILDREN"

In the streets of a small city in Turkey, the eyes of a young pastor, Ernst Christoffel, were focused on the children that hovered nearby.

Blind children with white sightless eyes; deaf children whose grunts and wild gestures made them look less than human; children with deformed limbs, crawling on hands and knees like the street dogs around them. All begging in order to survive.

"Whose children are these?" he asked. The answer - nobody's children. Blind, deaf, disabled, poor and abandoned, these children became his children. With this one strong and decisive act of practical love, Christian Blind Mission was born. Since 1908, CBM has quietly grown to be the

largest organization rescuing people, especially children, trapped in poverty by disability.

"We've become experts in giving people back their sight, getting kids up walking, opening ears to the sound of laughter, all things we take for granted," Dave McComiskey told a Miracles of Life breakfast audience on April 19 at the Hilton Suites Hotel in Markham.

As citizens of one of the most blessed countries in the world, Mr. McComiskey believes that Canadians mation, visit www.cbmicanada.org have a responsibility to "nobody's children" - the forgotten children in our world. Poverty and disability are strongly linked and it is the children who suffer the most in this cycle of

despair and pain. Each year CBM reaches four million children but the need is great, with 200 million children living in similarly desperate circumstances.

"We need people of compassion and people of vision to join with us....so that every child - no matter how disabled or alone - will know that they are somebody's child, that they are God's child," said Mr. McComiskey.
