"We then analyze, discuss and plan how best to get MGM quality out of a YDAPA budget," she said, with a smile. "Then it's countless trips to Fabricland where we always wait for sales, or scout the sale bins."

Care and Share, Value Village and Goodwill also play a leading role in the hunt for costumes, she said. "These sources yield excellent finds for many items and certain types of plays - generally the more modern ones."

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A wonderful partnership was born, and it has flourished ever since. "I was

at home and I really enjoyed working with (artistic director) Wayne (Hill), and the people were great fun. My background is in family studies and sewing," Ada said.

Doing a show may be fun, but it's also hard work. "Music Man was probably the most demanding, with over 150 costumes and changes," she said. "That's huge, even just keeping track of it all." People have suggested that they could rent out the costumes, "but then it becomes a business, and this is all volunteer."

There is one person whose presence they both keenly miss. "We must mention Pam Mandich and her outstandingly creative, original ideas over the years," said Dorothy, noting that when Pam left for Abu Dhabi with her family in December, she donated a wonderful assortment of fabrics, trims and other items for future costumes.

Although neither Dorothy nor Ada has children performing in YDAPA productions, Dorothy does have a strong family connection: three generations of her family are involved. "My daughter, Rebecca Romaniuk, is costume coordinator along with me, her husband John plays the king, and their twin daughters, Erica and Hilary, play the king's twin royal children. And Gramma sews!"

And the end result is magical, said YDAPA director Neil Bennett, director. "The King and I is a wonderful story and the music is superb. Our costumes are outstanding and through them and our dedicated actors we will make the world of 19th century Siam come to life."

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
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
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
