Springvale Invites Community To Opening Weekend

"A journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step," Chinese philosopher Lao-tzu (604-531 BC).

That quote neatly sums up Pastor Bob Flemming's thoughts as Springvale Baptist Church prepares for the official opening and dedication weekend for the facility's impressive new addition at 3885 Stouffville Rd., which has been under construction for four years. When the final phase is completed, "what we will have here is a campus ministry encompassing different people with like faith and values," said Pastor Flemming.

"We moved into the new building six months ago and we are continuing to grow," said Springvale board member John Halse. "We have an agreement with Stouffville Christian School who are currently at EastRidge (Church). They have the second floor of this building. Right now it's just a shell, but they plan to build it to their specifications and hope to be in by September."

Mother Goose Academy, run by Pat Byer, will continue to offer a preschool program at Springvale and on April 20, the Stouffville branch of the Richmond Hill Chinese Baptist Church, which had been using temporary space provided by Emmanuel International, held its first service in the original Springvale auditorium.

At present Springvale Baptist Church itself is holding services in the addition's gymnasium while awaiting the completion of the new auditorium. Meanwhile, construction on the beautiful lobby has been completed and it will be


open to the public for the dedication weekend on May 24 and 25. "Stations will be set up all through the facility so that people can meander around and enjoy the food which will be laid out on various tables," said Mr. Halse.

"I would say the template has now been laid, but all the parts are not filled in yet," said Pastor Flemming. "The other thing we have here is an opportunity for a sports ministry, with staff working in conjunction with the church, but also opening the door to people from the community to enjoy sports and recreation. We're looking at putting up a playing field, baseball diamonds and a soccer pitch on the back 15 acres."

Because of its location on the outskirts of town, Springvale is both a local and a regional church with a strong contingent of young families among the congregation, he said. "We have people coming from Stouffville, Markham, Unionville, Newmarket, Aurora, Richmond Hill and Uxbridge. There are seniors in the congregation, some of them have passed now, who envisioned this corner as a campus for God 30 years ago."

With the new facility up and running, said Pastor Flemming, "by September over 1,000 people will pass through its doors every week." Everyone is invited to drop into Springvale for tours and refreshments starting at 5 p.m. on May 24.
