

#### READERS WRITE Whose Oil Is It, Anyway?

To the Editor:

We have a free trade agreement with the United States and we are the largest oil suppliers to the United States.

A gallon of gas (four litres) in the U.S. costs \$3.25. In Canada, the price for four litres is \$5:20; therefore if we have more oil and we can afford to sell it, why aren't the prices the same? Oil companies tell us that the price per litre is not the same, and it is not controlled. If that's the case, why is every gas station selling it at \$1.30/litre or more, almost throughout the Province of Ontario? Is there a hotline between gas station operators and the oil companies?

Most oil companies are American-owned; why do they set the prices at the pumps throughout our province? The Canadian Government should not allow the oil companies to regulate the price; that is not what the market is meant to do. That is not free trade. It is not democratic; it is outright dictatorship by the oil companies.

I can see how governments can be dictatorial, but why are they allowing foreign oil companies to dictate to them? If the Liberal Party of Canada wants an election issue, why don't they force the government to tell foreign-owned oil companies to let the market to take its course, or else they will deregulate the prices?

Strange as it seems, we are the largest suppliers of oil to the U.S., we sell it cheaper to them, and we let them sell it back to us at a higher price. Do we have a political system? Do we have political parties in Canada? Or are they on the take from the oil companies? It is sad we have to suffer, being democratically and legally robbed day and night by our political parties.
