

## Stouffville resident hopes to generate business in the Dominican

Ask Bob Couperthwaite how business is these days and he'll tell you it's going south - to the Dominican Republic.

The 53-year-old owner/operator of Bulldog Generators on Ringwood Dr. in Stouffville is currently in Sosua, Dominican Republic, setting up a satellite branch of the business he started up here in town seven years ago. He intends to sell and service his Guardian line of home standby and commercial generators on the Caribbean island, taking advantage of that country's inconsistent supply of electricity.

"Their infrastructure is just not there, the hydro is turned off for a minimum of four hours a day," he said before departing for Sosua on the Dominican Republic's north coast. He is looking to service the growing electrical backup needs of the country's along with meeting the requirements of the numerous

"Every house down there has a generator, and so do all the resorts. They all need servicing, and basically, (the generators) are replaced every five years. So I'll start with the service work and then go for the future sales."

Bob has rented a shop on Sosua's main street and has hired a receptionist while he lines up sales and service up a shop for servicing the generators."

He's hoping to meet with the same success in the Dominican that he has had in his Stouffville location. "With all the blackouts and the unstable power grid it's turned into a lucrative business. And we get lots of commercial business because they can't have downed hydro."

His list of clients includes Enbridge, Magna, the Toronto School Board, Union Gas and various medical research labs. He services accounts throughout Western Ontario and has travelled as far as Halifax to look after his clients' needs.

Bob said he's taking a long-term approach to his Dominican operation and could see himself possibly branching out to other Caribbean islands. "If I can get things established I could see myself eventually semiretiring down there."

Another incentive is the sunny, warm climate of the half million German, Canadian and British residents, Caribbean. "I've always liked warmth. I've got some arthritis in my hands and I'm starting not to be able to work in the cold."
