Giving a future to those with disabilities

Chamber of Commercerecognizes director of Blind Mission International

Dave McComiskey had graduated with his commerce degree, and had begun a fairly successful career in marketing with a prominent Ontario corporation. But he wanted to make a more significant contribution to the world.

Two decades later, Dave is the Canadian executive director of Christian Blind Mission International (CBMI), and last month he was honoured by the Whitchurch-Stouffville Chamber of Commerce as its Corporate Citizen of the Year, an award which recognizes outstanding service and dedication to our worldwide community.

CBMI is a world wide organization founded in Germany in 1909 to assist the blind in developing countries. When the Canadian branch was founded in 1978, it located on Stouffville Road just east of Kennedy, across the road from the headquarters of one of its key partners, Emmanuel International. And that's where it's been ever since.

"Although our focus is still on helping the blind, we've found that our programs can assist those with many other kinds of conditions, from deafness to leprosy," says Dave. "We have projects in 114 countries around the globe, and CBMI Canada is directly involved right now in 76 projects in 31 countries. It's fascinating and important work."

The Stouffville Road office houses 23 staff, as well as conference facilities and a large talking book library and recording studio. For many years, Dave worked in the fund-raising area, and is now the man in charge.

"I think perhaps the reason the Chamber recognized CBMI at this time is that we were one of the first aid organizations on the ground running after the Dec. 26 tsunami in southern Asia. Within four hours of that disaster occuring, we were beginning relief with our local partners, and we're still working very hard over there."

"Most of our staff live right here in Whitchurch-Stouffville," Dave says, "and CBMI's relationship with the municipality has been an excellent one. In return, I think thanks in part to CBMI's work, this town has a great profile in the international development community."

Christian Blind Mission International currently has over 40,000 Canadian individuals and organizations contributing to its work around the world. And the grand prize, Business of the Year, went to Schickedanz Brothers, developers of distinctive homes in the Ballantrae area.


