LOCAL ITEMS.

On Monday morning of last week Geo. E. Reesor, manager of Locust Hill Creamery while going down stairs to the basement of the creamery slipped and fell to the bottom breaking his right arm just below the elbow and also dislocating the elbow joint.
A peculiar fact has come to the knowledge of the Department of Marine and Fisheries in connection with a shipment of lake trout which were sent to New Zealand some years ago from Canada. It was found that the fish, instead of remaining in the rivers, drifted down to the sea, and chere grew to the weight of 15 or 16 pounds.

His flight produced a great sensation and his creditors had to contend themselves with a very few cents on the dollar. His death was caused by heart failure brought on by mental misery. He was 62 years of age, and had led an active business life, but unfortunate speculations in real estate brought on financial ruin.
SIRGON ROLLER.—Lawyer Knapp, of Prescott, Ont., was recently at Ottawa exhibiting his invention for cheapening ocean steam transportation. Although a somewhat similar invention has already been patented in France, Mr. Knapp's idea is radically new, even as regards the French structure. He claims that his vessel will cross the ocean at a speed of 60 miles an hour, which means one day from Labrador to Ireland. The vessel will not use as much coal as the Campania and will go three times as fast. There will be double or treble the passenger accommodation for the same length of vessel. There will be no sea sickness; wreck is almost impossible. He expects to have his model ready for a practical test next summer and has an eminent engineer of Buffalo already at work on it.

NEW BUTTER FACTORY.—On Richmond street, Toronto is what, for want of a more appropriate name, might be called a butter factory. By means of machinery it converts the roughest old rancid butter into what appears as the choicest and sweetest article. This is shipped to the butter, alchemist, who straightway produces the sweet golden appetizer to the tune of a thousand pounds a day! The wonderful process is known to only three or four persons in America. The secret is jealously guarded and no one is allowed to enter the chamber of mysteries on Richmond street. The modus operandi, speaking in general terms is as follows. The old vile butter is first heated red hot and converted into oil. The oil is put through a blast and falls into a vat like a small snow storm. After being exposed to the air for some time it is churned into sweet milk or buttermilk. No chemicals are used whatever. The process will not work during the warm season of the year, June July and August. At present quantities are in full swing and great quantities are being exported to England.
