

**MARKHAM TWP. COUNCIL**

Owing to so many deputations and discussions Markham Council were unable to complete all their business on Feb'y 7th, and left over the matter of the appointment of Road Superintendent until this week.

A letter was received from the Ontario Hydro System giving an estimate of the cost of street lighting in Thornhill. It also stated that the cost of power not on Yonge St. would be paid by the Township, but that used on Yonge street would be divided between the two Townships, (Vaughan and Markham). A meeting will be held this week of all parties concerned to determine the matter further.

The Globe Indemnity Co. wrote re Geo. Court's claim for damage to car through defective road, that they could not consider same.

E. T. Stephens wrote enclosing cheque for \$500 balance of his contribution as per agreement re Township taking over road in Doncaster Park subdivision.

A deputation of seven residents on Helen Ave. in the Unity Garden subdivision, asked the council to take over that road, which they said would be impassible in the spring. The council pointed out that it would be impossible for the Township to assume the upkeep of many roads in the subdivisions being opened up. At Unity Gardens, for instance, the increased assessment on the farm sub-divided would not bring in over \$35 in taxes, and this amount would not do much road fixing. The reeve promised, however, that the council would look at the road in the spring.

A deputation of four ladies from the Unionville orchestra, headed by Mrs. Perkins, waited on the council asking permission to use the hall for practicing and to put piano in hall.

Donald McKinnon was heard asking for wood for an indigent family at Cashel and was instructed to get a cord of wood from G. A. M. Davison.

The clerk laid on the table a list of lands liable to be sold for arrears of taxes. There were 44 properties on the list, the majority of which were small holdings in sub-divisions in the front of the township—Doncaster Park and Hubbs & Hubbs. Only twelve of these properties were located east of the 4th con., and only one east of the 6th con. The largest block is 75 acres at Steel's Corners, and the smallest a quarter acre lot.

**BUYING SEED OATS**

Representatives of American seed houses are quite active this spring in selling seed oats in various parts of the province, one of the most widely advertised varieties is the Mammoth Cluster. This is a white grain side or mane oat and according to Prof. Squirrell its appearance is better than its performance in the field. The Field Husbandry Dept. at the College has tested out many varieties of the mane oat but none of it has measured up with the O.A.C. No. 144, or the Banner. They have a rather heavy course but somewhat weak straw. They are thick hulled and therefore very poor in quality. They stool poorly and ripen unevenly in the field. In experiments at Guelph the O.A.C. No. 144 oat outyielded the best varieties of side or mane oats by an average of over 21 bushels per acre. Many farmers in Ontario are buying seed oats of the Mammoth Cluster and other untested varieties, says Prof. Squirrell and paying from \$2.00 to \$2.50 per bushel for them, and have in their own grain bins seed oats which will produce more oats per acre and of better quality.

If you are in need of seed oats your local seed house is your safest man to confer with or a line to your Agricultural representative at Newmarket will put you in touch with a good reliable seed.
