GLASGOW.

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THE HYAMS' TRIAL

The Hyams' trial for the murder of Wells is likely to prove more serious for the accused than at first supposed. The testimony of Dr. A. J. Johnston goes to show that the wounds on the head were made by force from two different directions. The bone on one side of the jaw was fractured while the one on the other side was not, showing that it must have been resting on something.  
The doctor further said that it would not be possible for the weight to fall in the manner described without breaking other bones of the body.  
On cross examination, he said the blow or blows were probably given with a broad, rounded object.  
If the wound was done by a broad flat surface it would take a pressure of three or four hundred pounds.  
"That weight coming down on the head, if the man were standing would cut like a knife, cut part of the head off," said the witness.  
"If the man were standing erect he would be crushed down when the weight struck him. If his head were turned upward, the side of his body to which his head was inclined would be bruised and the head would be cut."  
This conclusion was drawn from the presumption that the weight would have ten feet fall.  
"The edge of that weight would cut wherever it struck," was the doctor's final opinion as he fingered the corners of the big iron chunk.  
Harry P. and Dallas T. Hyams were yesterday evening committed to trial by the Police Magistrate on a charge of having wilfully murdered William C. Wells in their warehouse in Colborne street on Monday, Jan 16 1893.  
Mr. E. F. B. Johnston counsel for defence, made an unsuccessful plea for the discharge of Dallas T. Hyams on the ground that there was no evidence to implicate him in the crimes.  
In dealing with the application Police Magistrate Denison said: "I don't wish to review all the evidence and argue the points discussed, but my impression is that, from the evidence adduced, there is enough to place the accused on trial. There is no doubt that the evidence is not so strong as just Dallas Hyams as against the prisoner. But the evidence has convinced me that the death of young Wells was not due to accident. There has been ample testimony to show that the weight could not have come off the hook and killed the deceased as alleged. Some one killed him and these two men were the only persons present when he met his death. Anyway, I don't want to argue the case and show the strong points against the prisoners. I will commit both for trial."
