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NEW YORK SPREAD OUT.

HOW A STRANGER MAY GET A BIRD'S EYE VIEW OF THE CITY.

How to View the Metropolis of the United States from All Points—The Colours of the State—Easy Stages of Three Miles Each.

I will suggest the method by which the visitor can get a bird's eye view of the city of New York as a whole, which the best map poorly conveys. To begin, I would have them view it from both sides, the Brooklyn and Jersey fronts, and the islands with their institutions. From the ferry-boats east and west, the visitor can obtain these "bird's-eye" views which various points afford, and which are rivaled only by the views from the Boston State House dome and the Eiffel tower in Paris. That from St. Paul's Cathedral in London, owing to the position of the dome, affords one a good view of the city, but not the top of the dome through the imagination, which it so truthfully excites. There will be a grand view of the city from the top of the dome of the public building which is situated at the corner of Broadway and Wall street.
