Occasionally we hear of great fortunes in the Bank of Holland left years ago by ancestors of persons living in Canada. Before spending any money in endeavoring to secure supposed fortunes it may be well to note that there is no Bank of Holland and also that by a Dutch Statute of 1852 all unclaimed inheritances after a lapse of five years irrevocably escheat to the state.

MAPLE SYRUP.—Henry Hoover, of Almira, has maple syrup operations under full swing. He has tapped 340 trees to the extent of over 600 spiles. It takes 3 hours to gather the sap and he makes about a gallon of 11lb syrup every hour. Mr. Hoover will be on the market here next Thursday with a good supply, so get your bottles and pails ready. We can vouch for the article as being A 1 in every respect.

The warm spring weather will in a few days be here and with it a large increase in the microbes which are sure to infest yards which are not cleaned of the accumulations of winter rubbish. As soon as possible the refuse in our back yards should be removed, as in many cases the lots are small and contain a well, which is very liable to have the water contaminated unless extreme cleanliness is punctually observed. Besides, the contents of all closets should forthwith be removed and thorough disinfection be resorted to. Cesspools should be wholly abandoned as they are constant menace to the health of the community, and especially in densely populated streets. Cleanliness is the next thing to godliness and those who neglect this great desideratum to good health will eventually have to endure the pains and penalties which always follows in the wake of filth.

Four churches on wheels, sent out and supported by the Baptist Publishing Society, are constantly travelling over the railroads in the thinly settled regions of the West, the pastor in charge ministering to the spiritual needs of people living in new settlements where there is no church, aiding poor Baptist congregations with gifts of books and the like, and doing general missionary work. The car Emmanual reached San Francisco from the South last week, and started on a tour through Oregon and Washington. It is 85 feet long, and the living apartments of the pastor at one end and a completely appointed church occupying the rest of the space. It contains an organ, lectern, and pulpit. The car carries Bibles in twelve languages and a large stock of hymn books and other publications. The railroads haul the cars free of charge, and the telegraph and telephone companies furnish franks to the pastors in charge. No collections are made at any of the services on the cars, the society supporting the travelling churches. Whenever a likely place for missionary work is found the car is sidetracked, and its presence advertised by posters, and in various other ways.

It is a noted fact that the Canada moth is gradually gaining ground in our apple orchards and causing an immense increase in the amount of cul's. Now Canadian apples, like Canadian cheese, have special reputation in the English market and to maintain this reputation and make the most out of the fruit it is absolutely necessary to use both germicides and fungicides. To apply these remedies a spray pump is required, which will cost a few dollars, but the increase in saleable fruit by this means will repay the outlay ten fold on an orchard of ordinary extent. Now is the time to call on the hardware dealers to get quotations for pumps or sprayers. A pamphlet giving method of preparation of remedies and time of application is usually supplied free with spray pump. Even if you do not decide to spray it will pay to get all possible information on the subject.

DEMILL'S COLLEGE BURNED.—On Monday night the tower roof of Demill's College, Oshawa, was ignited by the furnace chimney. Instantly the alarm was sounded, and the brigade was soon on its way to the scene, but, owing to the bad roads and the distance, they did not arrive until the fire had totally consumed the tower, and had communicated to the mansard roof. The nearest water supply was fully a quarter of a mile away, and of course was very inadequate to cope with the all-devouring element. The citizens, however, worked manfully, and a greater part of the furniture and fixtures, including ten pianos out of sixteen, were saved. The building was a large four-story brick structure, with a mansard roof. The size of the building was 150 feet long by 50 feet wide. It is known through its educational advantages from Halifax to Victoria, and many a young lady graduate will read of its destruction with regret. It has been in active operation since 1874 under the direction of the Rev. A. B. Demill, and has had an average attendance of 125 students per session. Luckily most of the girls were home on their Easter holidays, or probably the individual loss would have been very much greater. As it was however, about 40 of the students remained; and of these about 25 were in attendance at the organ recital, under the direction of Prof. Geiger, at the Simcoe Street Methodist Church. The students there suffered to a great extent. The Rev. Mr. Demill, being in Toronto at the time of the fire, did not hear of his loss until late. The college was bonused at its inception by the town to the extent of \$5,000.
