PUBLIC LIBRARY.—All members of Mechanics' Institute (now Public Library) whose subscriptions have expired, or will expire during the present month, by the first of May, will confer a favour on the Board of Management by renewing at once, as the Institute year ends with May 1st, and it is necessary that there should be as many members as possible in good standing before that date. The government grant to Public Libraries in villages will in future be less by \$100 than formerly, therefore the Board of Management will require a much larger membership in order to keep the Library and Reading Room up to their present standard.

BLACK KNOT.—This fungus pest makes rapid strides upon our common cherry trees, and unless every person who cultivates this tree persists in removing and burning these fungous growths promptly, this delicious fruit will soon be a thing of the past. With a tree pruner, which can be purchased for a trifle, the knots on the small twigs can be easily cut off, but where they occur on large main limbs we would recommend a good coat of linseed oil or castor oil, after paring off the knot with a sharp knife. The knot on the plum tree is of a totally different nature and not nearly so rapid in its propagation. It is also much more easily kept in subjection by a similar course of treatment. Eternal vigilance is required if we are to succeed in cultivating these two excellent fruits.
