How the Sources of Rivers are Best Found - The Mississippi Not Now the Largest River on the North American Continent-" China's Sorrow."

It is a recognized fact in science that very few great rivers have been thoroughly explored by going up stream. For nearly 2000 years travelers and explorers endeavored to discover the sources of the Nile by ascending that wonderful river. But by the time they had reached the difficult part of the stream their supplies and energy were exhausted, and they could go no further. It is only by seeking the sources of rivers by overland routes that explorers meet with success. It was in this manner that Henry M. Stanley traced the route of the Congo in Africa. In this way of procedure Frederick Schwatka was enabled to float down to Yukon, and Speke found the secret of the river Nile.
