A despatch from Washington, D.C., in regard to the situation in Mexico says: There is a reduction in condition of all cereals as reported by the statisticians of the Department of Agriculture. The decline from July 1 to Aug. 1, is from 93.1 to 73.8 in corn, from 94.4 to 83.2 in spring wheat, from 81.0 to 70.1 in oats, from 88.1 to 82.8 in barley. The condition of buckwheat is 90.1 and of spring rye 88.8. The condition of rye is reduced from 91.7 to 77.7.

Gen. Booth, of the Salvation Army, not content with forbidding his officers below the rank of captain to marry, has issued the most stringent edicts against smoking, in which he denounces the habit as wasteful, dirty, injurious, and entirely incompatible with the duties of a Christian soldier.
