ADDITIONAL LOCAL

John Minns is home on a visit. R. P. Coulson has returned to town. The Czar of Russia is seriously ill and his recovery is doubtful.

Our fruit dealers made a large shipment of peaches to town yesterday the price being the lowest ever known. Farmers are sowing winter wheat on the fallow ground, but say it is as yet impossible to get the stubble ground in condition for sowing.

The amount realized yesterday at the Industrial Fair, Toronto, \$19,000, the greatest for one day which has been since the fair was inaugurated. Even with present canal accommodation it costs much less to carry freight the full length of the St. Lawrence, even up stream, than across it.

It is now believed that chemical and medical science will soon make the vegetable foods—potatoes, pumpkins, etc.—digestible by man without first passing through animal intermediaries. On Saturday last a very painful accident befel Mrs. S. Russell, of the 4th con, of Uxbridge. She was out in the yard and was about to enter the house, when on reaching the door she slipped and fell, breaking her right arm just above the wrist. Medical assistance was procured and the arm set.

The North-west Mounted Police are being armed with 200 Lee-Metford carbines and two Maxim guns, which can be carried on horse back. The Maxim guns will discharge 300 bullets each per minute. Charles Seaton, who was badly shaken up by defects in a grain lifter, has considerably improved and returned to his work. Miss Sawdon, of Hartman with tapeline, scissors and needle has been a useful acquisition to Bloomington for several days.

James Grose, a wealthy farmer living in the north-east part of this township, has been in poor health for the last decade and this week he is reported to be much worse. Wm. McQuinn, who owns the residence lately occupied by the Mayor of Bloomington, is suffering from an injured eye caused while fighting fire in the late drought.

Mrs. Thomas Walker and the other legatees of her father's estate met in Markham on Saturday to decide whether they would insist on the conditions of the will or abandon the estate to the executor and widow. THE SHIP OF THE FUTURE.

Professor Henry Busse and Richard B. Panton, of Williamsport, Pennsylvania, have perfected an invention which they claim promises to revolutionize ocean travel. The passage across the Atlantic can, they say, be made in three days. The scheme as explained by the inventors is about as follows:—Besides somewhat changing the construction of the hull the inventor attaches a series of specially designed propellers to the side instead of at the stern of a ship, and he claims that a vessel so propelled would cross the Atlantic in three days. The propellers are made with two sets of paddles, three in each set, alternately side by side on the same shaft, the blades being so arranged as to fill each dip and at the same time throw the water away from the sides of the vessel, thus lessening friction. They are attached to the side of the vessel in pairs—that is, on shafts, which run through the vessel crosswise and revolve constantly in dead water in "pockets" or indentures. The propellers are attached to the side of the vessel as stated, the first pair being well forward going astern the propellers are located under the water line at equal intervals, say 100 feet, so that a ship 600 feet long will carry five sets of propellers, three on the stern being raised a little to facilitate steering and to steady the ship. The motive power can be applied in various ways—by big engines in the bow, midships, and stern, working directly on the propeller shaft and at the same time running dynamos to generate electricity for motors to drive the intermediate propellers, or by compound rotary engines on each shaft. But the special merit of the application of any power is that the shafts work independently of each other, so that if one breaks the ship continues on her course just the same while repairs are being made to the propellers after the shutters have been closed down over them. The water-tight compartments are arranged on both sides of the vessel, thus doing away with the bulkhead compartments. It is claimed that in a case of an accident if the "midship is struck and breaks each part of the ship could be closed water-tight compartments and shutters, and, having separate engines and propellers, all working independent of each other, the vessel could continue its way to port. Speed can be gained without question, through giving each propeller sufficient water surface to action. With the propellers in use now two-thirds of the power employed is lost in the 200,000 horse power employed in two propellers of, say, fifteen feet in diameter, can only push against a limited space of water, where in this new invention the power being distributed over, say, twenty propellers of five feet diameter each one has its own volume of water to act on. It is also claimed that, besides gaining higher speed a vessel of this kind will be perfectly safe; it will keep its ship evenly balanced and will cause it to cut steadily through the water; a number of its propeller will always be doing their work, and will keep the ship from rocking and pitching in a heavy sea. A working model, resembling built, which will be propelled by electric power, and will give a practical illustration of its workings.
