DISTRICT AND GENERAL

One more village is putting down a cement roadway. Work is well under way at Richmond Hill. The total contract is \$62,000, of which the village share is \$8,200.
The Markham Planting Mills have taken the contract to re-build the Markham Slipper Factory which was recently partly destroyed by fire. They have already put on a new roof and expect to have the building ready to hand Mr. Phillips the keys the first of next month.

The Aurora fire brigade had its first opportunity of fighting a fire with their fire truck when a call for help was received when fire broke out in the farm home of Mr. Geo. Neal on the 3rd con. Whitechurch. The flames had gained considerable headway before the call was sent in, but the brigade with the aid of the truck were able to confine the fire to the house in such a way that while the latter, which was constructed of brick was totally destroyed the summer kitchen which was built of wood and also a garage which stood less than two feet away were both saved. There is no doubt that had it not been for the fire truck the barn which is situated not far from the house would have been destroyed also. Most of the fire fighting was done with the chemical tank—Sec'y Fire Brigade.

Charles W. Widdifield, a prominent lawyer and resident of Newmarket, after a number of weeks of being remanded, appeared for trial in the County Police Court last Friday before Magistrate T. H. Brunton on a charge of stealing \$2,400 from A. McKee of Newmarket. Through his counsel Waldon Law, he elected to be tried by his Worship and entered a plea of guilty. Mrs. Margaret McKee, called by Crown Attorney Frank Moore, informed the court that she and her husband had \$2,400 which they wanted to invest in mortgages. "We paid it in for investment, she said in answer to the Crown. "Did you receive any mortgage?" "No sir." "Your money is gone?" "Yes sir." That was all the evidence taken and Widdifield was remanded for one week for sentence. Mr. Law suggested that his client be physically examined. The Crown pointed out that this had been ordered by the Attorney General department. Magistrate Brunton concurred and ordered examination.
