APPLE EXPORT TRADE.—There is a brisk demand for apples and some large sales have been made for export in Ontario this week. American buyers have been making purchases at \$1.25 to \$1.55 per bbl., f. o. b. point of shipment, and \$1.50 to \$1.60 is being paid for choice winter apples and in some cases 15c to 20c more has been obtained. Prices in Liverpool, according to late advices are 17s to 18s, with 12s to 13s as the average price for fruit in good condition. It is reported that the crop in England and on the continent is better than at first reported, and it is also claimed that the recent rains in Ontario have improved the crop, and that the yield will be larger than anticipated. Picking of winter apples will be general in about two weeks, and all who are engaged in that work should remember that the apples that secure the best prices are those that are carefully picked and as carefully packed and taken to the care with which the fruit is handled depends the maintenance of the high reputation which Canadian apples hold in the English markets. Last year a good deal of money was lost on apples that reached the English markets in poor condition through not having been properly handled. This can be easily avoided by a little care and if farmers and apple growers would pay more attention to this matter the exporters would not so often insist on buying the fruit on the trees and the result would be that the growers would get more for the apples.

Nova Scotia's fruit export is of growing importance. The province will produce this year 112,000 barrels of apples and 110,000 baskets of plums, besides a large supply of small fruits. Altogether it is estimated that the surplus for exportation will bring to that province \$800,000.

THE SEALING CLAIMS.—It turns out that Mr. Secretary Gresham made no offer to settle with the Canadian sealers on the basis of \$125,000, or any other basis. All that he did was to promise to recess for its "serious consideration." Under the British system of responsible government this offer would have to be carried through Parliament, or Parliament would have to get another Ministry. The United States system is different. The Ministry may recommend, but that is the extent of their liability. Whichever way the question may carry, the Cabinet position remains the same.

The Claremont correspondent of the Picking News writes:—Worthy Miles was taken before Magistrates Holden, Gorow and Barber here Tuesday afternoon charged with stealing three cattle from Wm. Cowie of the 7th con. It seems that at the last division court, Cowie received a verdict of \$80 for feed and damage done by the cattle, and he was to retain possession of them until Miles showed a receipt from the clerk of the court showing that the money had been paid in. Tuesday was the last day of grace. Instead of going to Greenwood with the \$80, Miles went and took the cattle from Cowie's place. A warrant was at once sworn out, when Miles was arrested by Constable Gibson, assisted by Isaac Mantle. It is said that Mantle drew a revolver while his chief buckled the bracelets. This was done in case the prisoner should resist arrest, and he being a powerful man should seriously wound the guardians of the peace. The court was held in sitting room of the Wilson house, when a large number of witnesses were examined. After the evidence had all been produced, the prisoner was acquitted after agreeing to pay the \$80 and all costs in connection with the matter up to date.
